Introduction

The thesis aims to be a critical study of the mythical structure in the Earlier Works of Ezra Pound . The study originated in an atmosphere of hot critical debates about the validity of new critical methods .

Questions about the problem of new critical methods have never ceased to exert a strong influence on young research - workers from the early 1980 's onwards. These debates started in Egypt with the publication of two literary journals: Fusul, a quarterly journal of literary criticism, issued by the General Egyptian Book organization and Alif, a yearly journal of comparative poetics, issued by the Department of English and Compartive Literature at the AUC. From the publication of its first number in October, 1980, Fusul dealt a very heavy blow to established critical and scholary conventions. The "homespun "hypotheses of impressionistic and positivistic criticism were radically called into question, and the eyes of young academic and non - academic researchers were violently opened to many new vistas of critical and literary debates. Egyptian academic and literary life became well acquainted with the latest advances in literary criticism.

There were many labels. Russian Formalism, Structurallism and Post - Structuralism, ModemPsycho - analytic critcism, Genetic Structuralism were among the many vistas that were opened to the eyes of a generation which practically knew nothing beyond Anglo - American criticism and the Positivism of Hippolyte Taine. It was impossible, therefore, to

write this thesis in isolation of the critical fervour which originated in the early eighties both outside and inside the conventional academic circles .

The selection of a certain methodological approach is usually related to the procedures and aims of that particular approach. It is also related to the problem of critical perspective which is usually informed and defined by that methodology. The methodology of this thesis grew out of a very difficult and dynamic dialogue with these methodological interrelationships. Methodologically, The thesis will be broadly located within the general framework of Formalist and Structuralist criticism. The main procedures and critical strategies will be based on the Formalist, Structuralist and Post - Structuralist Framework.

There will be moments, however, when the main critical trajectory swerves to assimilate procedures from Anlgo - American New criticism, Marxism, Positivism or Psychoanalysis. Such borrowings will never be meant to turn the thesis into an inter- disciplinary study. They will be simply meant to broaden, rather than subvert, the main critical perspective adopted in the thesis.

The choice of the Stucturalist framework of analysis, as well as the deviations from it in certain areas of the thesis, are, in fact, dictated by the nature of the earlier works of Ezra Pound. These works are elusive, highly experimental and reflect a predominance of the technical over other concerns in Pound's earlier poetry. The scope of the thesis will comprise what can be termed as the earlier text of Ezra Pound. Such a text

will include the earlier verses and prose works from the publication of A Lume Spento in 1908 up to the publication of the three Ur - Cantos of 1915 - 1914 . These works are collected in two books . The first book is called Collected Early Poems of Ezra Pound, edited by Michael John King . The book contians the ninety - nine poems which Pound published in his early books but rejected later when he made a final selection in his Personae or Collected Poems. Although these poems were rejected by Pound and described as stale cream - puffs, they proved to be of great value for the exploration of his critical views . The second book is entitled Personae, Collected Shorter Poems of Ezra Pound, edited by Pound himself. The three Ur - Cantos which Pound subsequently revised in his published Cantos are to be found in Ronald Bush's The Genesis Of Ezra Pound's Cantos.

Pound's prose works are many. Among these prose work, A B C of Reading and literary Essays of Ezra Pound, edited by T. S. Eliot, are considered to be his most important works. Other prose works include The letters of Ezra Pound . edited by D . D . Paige , Guide to Kulchur and Pavanes and Divagations. Other prose materials were simply culled by the student from secondary sources.

The thesis falls into four chapters, as follows:

Chapter One: -

Chapter one is entitled " The Structure Of Myth " . It will be concerned

with the theoretical problems raised in the current studies of myth . It will handle two problems, i . e .the problem of definition and that of structure . The chapter will also be concerned with the questions of reference and signification . The chapter falls , therefore , into two sections . The first section will be related to the question of reference . Most of the referential approaches to myth will be discussed and criticized in the light of Structuralist and Post - Structuralist hypotheses . The second section will be related to the question of signification . This section will be devoted to the Structuralist approach to the study of myth . It will discuss the mechanism and function of myth as a linguistic sign in a second - order semiotic system . The Formalist features of the mythical discourse and its symbolic nature will be outlined .

Chapter Two: -

Chapter Two is entilted "Mythical Intertextuality". It will be concerned with the intertextualistic nature of the Poundian text. It will offer some critical alternatives to traditional categories such as scriptor, text and intertextuality. With the help of these new critical tools, the earlier verses and prose works of Ezra Pound will be studied as complementary parts of a unified text. The Poundian concept of intertextuality and his creative application of it in his earlier works will be discussed. The play of intertextuality in Pound 's earlier text, namely the primitive intertext, the mystical intertext and the mythical intertext.

Chapter Three: -

Chapter Three will be entitled "Myth and the Structure of the Image". It will be concerned with Pound's Imagist Poetics, Pound's Image and its relation to myth and the Imagist techniques in the myth poems. The chapter will discuss Pounds's employment of a number of technical and stylistic devices for creating the Image. The chapter will also discuss the stylistic presence of the Image as a form of fragmentation and condensation or as a form of ellepsis.

The chapter will also discuss the employment of other technical devices such as super - position and juxtaposition, montage, rhythmic definition, dislocated syntax and unusual forms of typography.

Chapter Four: -

Chapter Four will be entitled "The Structure of the Mythical Masks" The Chapter will be concerned with two questions. The first question is: What are the reasons which account for the persistent use of the mask technique in Pound's poetry? The second question is: How is the mask structually present in his poetry? The mask technique will be seen as a poetic answer to the technical, existential and ideological dilemmas which govern the grdual but highly energetic development of Pound's syncretic poetic project. The second section of the chapter will stress the structural elements of the Poundian mask. The section will trace the origin of the mask technique back to classical drama.

The Poundian mask will also be regarded as a synthesis of two types

of dramatic monologue: The Browningesque and the Yeatsian. That is why Pound's relation to the technique of dramatic monologue in Browning and the practice of the masks in Yeats's poetry will be examined. The synthetic nature of the Poundian mask will also be examined and a relation between Pound's practice of the mask and I. A. Richards 'definition of metaphor will be proposed. The rest of the chapter will be concerned with the formal elements of the mask poem in Pound. These elements comprise tone, voice, point of view, narrative authority, referential and ambivalent uses of pronouns and the multiple layers of irony.

The conclusion of the thesis will emphasize some findings related to the thesis and state some recommendations for future studies about the same topic .

Chapter One The Structure of Myth

Chapter one

The Structure of Myth

The Problems of Definition.

The first problem raised by myth is a problem of definition. The problem of definition raises many interrelated questions, namely the questions of reference, structure, signification and interpretation.

The question of reference is primarily a historical question. It leads up to humanity's vision of itself in its various phases of evolution. The referential approaches, each in its own way, tend to clarify the relation between the position of the mythic marrative and some external origin of meaning. They have diachronically established details of the development of myth in the light of social customs, economic forces or psychological factors.

The question of structure is closely related to the question of signification and interpretation. The Structural approach to myth sets aside the question of referentiality which the referential approaches have developed. It tends to concentrate on the nature of the "mythic" in order to reveal the ontological status of myth as discourse.

TheStructural approach to myth investigates the dynamic interrelations of the formally constitutive units of the mythic discourse. Thus, while the referential approaches reduce myth to some form of reality, Structuralism
