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
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INTRODUCTION AND AIMS OF THE STUDY

- 1 -

The development of the nursing profession has routed the interest among nurses to seek the means to improve the quality of nursing services, to maintain and promote health and well being of the people and their societies (Maanen, 1984). In practice, the improvement of the quality of nursing service is an important element of the health services in general.

Interest in quality care improvement have grown strongly over the last three decades, although the first documented study in nursing and development of standards is back dated to *Florence Nightingale* (1858) (Lang, et al., 1984). The adoption of a conceptual frame work within which quality can be evaluated, is an essential requirement towards quality care development (Haussman, et al., 1977).

The nursing department, as the organizing body of nursing activities functions as a quality control system. Its general purpose is to evaluate and monitor compliance with standards of nursing practice, to ensure optimal care delivery. Quality control is composed of interdependent components with specific purposes, when effectively operating, they reflect compliance with nursing standards. Every component has distinctive roles in quality control for goal attainment (*Jernigan*, et al., 1983). Hospital administrators specify the nursing activities and resources which, when systematically combined into a manageable package, yield the highest quality of care (*Froebe*, et al., 1979), and (*Jernigan*, et al., 1983).

Records and record-keeping system is an integral part of programming health services; to assure quality care. Although no one method can guarantee excellence, certainly modernization of health-related documents is highly important (Weed, 1970). The retrospective audit technique is used nowadays for reviewing and evaluating patient's nursing care, after patient discharge to demonstrate the quality of care, or some aspects of it, depending on the intended objectives (Elhert, et al., 1978). The retrospective audit technique is considered as one of the most valid measures of quality care (Ganong, et al., 1980). The information gained from measurements made by using the audit technique provides means for accounting of the quality of records and recording. It helps in identifying and describing areas of strengths and weaknesses of care which are basic for planning ways to improve the quality of service.

In Egypt, quality assurance in nursing is considered at both official and non official levels. Aspects of care improvement activities; including the development of better nursing training programs, establishment of university schools of nursing, field studies, and lately the development of standards for different nursing services. There is a reason to belive that the application of a system of retrospective nursing auditing at Ain-Shams Specialized Hospital, (a relatively newly established hospital), will provide the means by which the nursing service department of that hospital, can examine the quality of nursing records, and hence ensure quality care to the patients.

The present study will therefore focus on the development of a retrospective audit technique; to be used for systematic review and examination of the nursing records. The goal of the study is to evaluate the extent to which current nursing care practices comply with acceptable nursing performance standards. It is assumed that the findings of such a

study will provide a means for improving the quality of nursing care at that setting as well as similar ones.

Hence, the aims of the study are:

- 1. To develop standards and criteria for auditing nursing records.
- 2. To develop a retrospective nursing auditing technique.
- 3. To identify areas of deficiency and non-compliance with standards and criteria.
- 4. To propose corrective actions for improving the system of nursing recording as a means to improve the quality of care.

REVIEW OF LITERATURE
