This research discus the approach of housing microfinance through investigating different housing microfinance programs in developing countries and their characteristics and lending methodologies. It also overviews implemented site and services housing projects in Egypt and examining difficulties facing these projects in order to establish and develop a convenient housing finance strategy for low-income groups in Egypt.

Summary

In developing countries, housing is considered a major economic, political and social issue. As populations continue to grow and urbanization accelerates, the necessity of providing adequate housing mounts. There is a strong relationship between urbanization, housing investment and national wealth. Where the world's rate of urbanization is reaching a peak, and as a consequence the need for additional resources for this sector is increasing. This raises the logical question: where will these resources for housing come from?

Previous studies has shown that the key principles must be: to provide 'housing finance' incrementally and in ways that support urban livelihoods and asset formation rather than increase vulnerability through debt, and which build social capital rather than individualism and mistrust.

This research arises from the growing need for housing finance among low-income groups in developing countries generally, in Egypt specifically. This research discusses different programs of housing microfinance adopted in a number of developing countries.

This thesis is constructed as follows.

Chapter One; reviews the research objectives, research problem and research goal as well as the research methodology. While Chapter Two; examines different problems and common circumstances facing developing countries and major constraints facing the delivery of housing for low-income groups. Further in **Chapter Three**, the research examines the international trends of housing finance, examines their mechanisms and challenges facing their applicability for low-income groups. As for Chapter Four, it provides an insight to the approach of housing micro-finance, its perspective and importance, its clients and providers, describing its characteristics and different funding strategies. Chapter Five; focuses largely on different housing microfinance programs offered by microfinance institutions in developing countries because that is where considerable innovation has taken place, and where there are indicative signs that further value might be added. Chapter Six; provides an overview of the housing policies in Egypt, challenges facing the Egyptian housing market, and examines two site and services projects that had a great effect on the housing strategy in Egypt. Finally, Chapter Seven; provides key findings concluded and recommendations that help setting up a microfinance initiative in Egypt.
