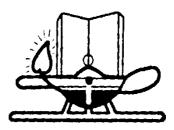

Long vowels are transcribed: \mathcal{L}^{\dagger} - $\bar{\mathbf{a}}$, \mathcal{L} - $\bar{\mathbf{u}}$, \mathcal{L} - $\bar{\mathbf{a}}$. The two diphthongs appear as aw and ay. The definite article in compound names is always given as "al".

Preface

This thesis proposes to examine the office of the vizierate in Egypt during the Mamlūk period (648-923 AH / 1250-1517 AD). The subject of this study has been chosen because it deals with a very important position that has not been studied before except in an article presented by Aḥmad 'Abd al-Rāziq¹. This article tackled the meaning of the vizierate, its development and the supposed duties of the vizier. This article also included the list of viziers' names during the Mamlūk period. Also, Muḥammad al-Ašqar tackled in his book² the history of the vizierate's system during that period. As for the nature of the book, it restricted the writer to give a quick view to the viziers' role during that period.

Actually, the importance of the high position of the viziers in the Mamlūk period, in addition to the influence of this office in the Mamlūk society, created the need for a detailed study comprising this office and all the artistic works and monuments related to it. The study concentrates on the office of the vizier and its historical importance, in addition to his position, characteristics, duties and architectural works and artistic pieces during the Mamlūk period.

This thesis attempts to provide that study by assembling as much as possible to basic information on the viziers as well as their works in Egypt during the Mamlūk period. In attempting to explore this topic, a number of previous studies were studied. There have been several valuable studies that assisted this thesis such as the studies of the chancelleries.

The chronicles were among the main sources of information for this thesis such as "Tārīḥ al-Malik al-Nāṣir Muḥammad ibn Qalāwūn al-Ṣāliḥī w-Awlāduh" of al-Šuǧāʿī (d. 745 AH / 1344 AD) provided me with the basic information about the reign of al-Nāṣir Muḥammad ibn Qalāwūn. al-ʿUmarī (d. 749 AH / 1349 AD) in "Masālik al-abṣār fī mamālik al-amṣār" has provided the researcher by some useful information about the classification of the vizier among other military classes at his time, as it was classified in the second rank after the sulṭān and when Nāʾib al-salṭanah was innovated, it classified as the third rank after the sulṭān and Nāʾib al-salṭanah in addition to discussing the costumes of the viziers.

The studies of the biographies were also among the useful sources that helped the researcher such as the biography of al-Ṣafadī (d. 764 AH / 1363 AD) "al-Wāfī
