Summary

This study is conducted on 12 eulogies delivered in honor of the American boxer Muhammad Ali. I adopt the approach of discourse-historical analysis (DHA) using some of the tools of corpus linguistics and Halliday's systematic functional linguistics (SFL). I track down the messages conveyed by the eulogists concerning the heated sociopolitical atmosphere in America at the time of Ali's death through their portrayal of him. Ali has passed away at a time when xenophobia against immigrants, especially Muslims, prevailed in the country and when the African American community suffered from police brutality. The results showed that the majority of the African American speakers highlighted Ali's racial pride and the positive role Islam played in his life.

Abstract

This study aims at tracing the social and political messages inherent in 12 eulogies delivered in a memorial service for the American boxer Muhammad Ali on June 10, 2016. The eulogies are transcribed manually from a video downloaded from *YouTube*. As a Black American Muslim, Muhammad Ali's identity was significant to the sociopolitical situation in America at the time of his death. America, by the time of Ali's death, had witnessed a series of extrajudicial killings of African Americans. Furthermore, Ali's death coincided with the 2016 American presidential elections during which there were calls to prohibit Muslims from entering the USA. This sociopolitical situation inevitably made a great impact on the eulogies delivered for Ali. In this study, I adopt the qualitative approach of discourse-historical analysis (DHA) making use of some of the quantitative research tools of corpus linguistics. In the quantitative part of the analysis, I explore the concordance lines and frequencies of relevant keywords and references. Subsequently, a qualitative analysis is conducted to gain insight into the sociopolitical undertones in the eulogists' representation of Ali drawing on Halliday's systematic functional linguistics (SFL) tools. The results show that most of the African American speakers promoted racial pride by stressing Ali's own racial pride and marking certain incidents and movements from African American history that corresponded to the current Black Lives Matter movement. Moreover, some speakers highlighted the role of Islam in making Ali

avoid wars and violence at a time when the American government engaged in bloody conflicts.
